


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
Conference Welcome


Pre-Conference: Using Intentional Serendipity to Create Opportunities and How To Use the Holland Code

Using Intentional Serendipity to Create Opportunities

In a perfect world, assessments can assist a client in choosing an occupation. But, the chaos of life often complicates things for all of us. This workshop will look at what we can do to help a person "Plan" their "Happenstance" or what I call "intentional serendipity". Learn how to help students create unplanned events and to look at career exploration as an opportunity to discover new occupations. Discover ways that you can use intentional serendipity in your daily work. Based upon the Happenstance Learning Theory.

Holland Interest Theory - How it works and possible problems

This portion of the workshop explores the Holland Interest theory, the #1 career interest theory in the world for assisting people in understanding the world of work. Holland is a trait-factor theory that simply states that "if you like to do these kinds of activities, then you will most likely want to do these types of jobs". We will explore the 6 Holland types, do a Holland-based assessment, and explore what works and what does not work at times with this theory. We will learn about the importance of congruent scores and differentiation between scores.

Lindsay has been involved in TRIO leadership within her state and region for the past five years serving as the Vermont Educational Opportunity Program (VEOP) President-Elect (2018-2020) and President (2020-2022). Lindsay participated in COE's Executive Leadership Institute (2019) and NEOA's Arnold Mitchem Leadership Institute (2021) and has always credited TRIO for her academic and professional success. #TRIOWORKS!

Lindsay has a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from the University of Vermont (2006) and a Master's of Education (Curriculum and Instruction) from Northern Vermont University Lyndon (2017). She lives in the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont with her husband Brandon, two sons Arlo and Theo, and chocolate lab, Gus. In her free time she enjoys reading, puzzles, playing cribbage and fishing with her sons and dance parties in the kitchen.

MEEOA Rising Star

The MEEOA Rising Star Award identifies emerging professionals who are former participants of Maine's educational opportunity programs. This award recognizes people just beginning to make an impact in their careers and communities and honors emerging leaders who strive toward the highest levels of personal and professional accomplishment. They excel in their chosen field, devote time and energy to their community in a meaningful way, and serve as a role model for others. Rising Stars demonstrate excellence, creativity, and initiative in their profession. They have an Associate's or Bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education, or are an outstanding senior-level student. They engage in or are developing leadership roles in civic, community, or professional development activities. Rising Stars have participated in an educational opportunity program that has had a significant impact upon their ability to achieve educational and/or professional objectives.

MEEOA Rising Star 2024 - Larissa Holland

Larissa Holland has been an invaluable member of the UB program at Bowdoin College since 2013, participating in UB summer sessions in high school, working as summer staff, and now as the guardian of her younger sibling who is a current student in the program. Coming from the rural hamlet of Jonesboro, in remote Washington County, tragedy struck Larissa's life in her early teens with the loss of her father. Despite this significant loss, she emerged as a leader and role model in the community, excelling at both UB and Washington Academy and earning a place in Smith College's class of 2020.

At Smith, she navigated her first gen experience with aplomb and excelled academically. In 2019, she was one of just 55 students in the US to receive the prestigious Udall Scholarship, recognizing scholarship, leadership, and a commitment to a career in the environmental field. She also earned an equally prestigious internship with NOAA. In the second half of her academic career, she lost her mom and beloved grandparents; Larissa pressed on. She celebrated her commencement on a Zoom call with all the people who had supported her to this amazing moment of becoming a Smith College graduate, from Smith to Downeast Maine.

She now divides her time between Jonesboro and Portland, working as an aviation sustainability consultant, rural youth organizer, and development advisor for JustME for JustUS, an organization that works to empower and mobilize youth around climate justice and community health. In October, she was nominated and appointed to GrowSmart Maine's board of directors, a term which she will start in January 2024.





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MEEOA Lifelong Learner Award

The MEEOA Lifelong Learner award was developed in 2020 by the Executive Committee and Alumni Committee to recognize lifelong learners who are former or current participants of Maine's educational opportunity programs, TRIO and other educational opportunity programs alike. The Lifelong Learner Award honors those current participants and alumni who demonstrate a lifelong love of learning and a dedication to learning experiences whether inside or outside the classroom.

MEEOA Lifelong Learner 2024 - Ali Edwards



Ali Edwards has been a participant in SMCC's TRIO SSS program since spring 2022. Ali came to our office after taking a 6+ year break from SMCC and our office hasn't been the same ever since. She has become an integral member of our community, advancing rapidly from a student-worker to a student employee (unprecedented in our office), and eventually our sole practicum student this Fall. We felt comfortable asking Ali to step into these roles because she seamlessly interacts with students, staff, and leadership. When helping in the TRIO

space, she is present and mindful of being inclusive of those who have been marginalized or feel forgotten. She builds trust and rapport with people by simply being a genuine person who knows what it's like to endure and overcome hardship.

The list of Ali's accomplishments are long and will continue to grow. Some of the highlights include: Receiving both the Maine Community Foundation's Adult Learner Scholarship and SMCC's Foundation Scholarship; being only one of 20 single mothers selected in Maine to participate in Project HOME Mother's Trust Pilot program; and advocating to lawmakers through opportunities with the Maine Equal Justice (MEJ) and Mayors and Counties for a Guaranteed Income about the benefits of Universal Basic Income. This semester, Ali also developed and led a group focused on discussion with students about SAMHA's eight domains of wellness. We are fully confident that Ali will reach her goal of obtaining her Masters in Social Work and advocating for Maine's most vulnerable individuals and our larger community.

MEEOA Achiever Award

MEEOA Achiever Awards are given to outstanding graduates of Maine's educational opportunity programs. MEEOA Achievers have received a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution of higher education and are recognized as a person of high stature within their profession or have received recognition for their outstanding academic achievements. Achievers are employed above the entry-level designation for their profession or have received a post baccalaureate degree or are enrolled in a post baccalaureate program. They have made significant civic, community, or professional contributions. Their participation in an educational opportunity program has had a significant impact upon their ability to achieve educational and/or professional objectives.

MEEOA Achiever Award 2024 - Lana Cook



Lana Cook, Ph.D., has participated in three TRIO programs, including Upward Bound at UMO with Lori Wingo, and SSS and McNair at UNH. Since completing her doctorate at Northeastern University in 2014, she has been employed at MIT for just under a decade in a wide variety of roles. Her current role is serving as Associate Director with the MIT Systems Awareness Lab. During her tenure at MIT, Lana has been on the forefront of their efforts to share intellectual and academic resources in open source knowledge and technology, with a particular emphasis on expanding access

to underserved communities.

Lana is deeply skilled at combining her caring nature, academic preparation, and intellect to organize events that promote social justice and make the world a better place. Her work at MIT has initiated conferences and gatherings focused on raising awareness of the lived experiences of refugees and migrants, designing workforce pathways for displaced communities, and exploring the potential of AI and education. She has also been working directly with educators running professional development opportunities about "Compassionate Systems Framework," a toolkit that combines systems thinking, social-emotional learning, and leadership development to support educators and young people in advancing change in their local communities.

In Lana's words, "Both Upward Bound and McNair gave me the confidence, tools, and knowledge to pursue higher education. My education was enriched by the peer and mentor networks that these programs provided. These programs definitely prepared me for the rigors of both undergraduate and graduate education. I feel very much indebted to Upward Bound and McNair for the gift of education" (NEOA Alumni Directory). It certainly feels like the right time for this triple TRIO Alumna, scholar, expansive practitioner, and devoted social justice advocate to be recognized as a TRIO Achiever in her native state of Maine.

MEEOA President's Award



MEEOA President's Award 2024 - Myles Ouellette

Myles Ouellette has a very deep connection with TRIO programs. As a student at Van Buren High School, Myles participated in both Upward Bound and Educational Talent Search programs. Soon after graduation, he enlisted in the Army. While serving he was injured and sadly developed an addiction to painkillers. Addiction brought him to prison and prison was where he found the Maine Educational Opportunity Program. As a MEOC participant he took time to explore his options, options he never saw as possible. With guidance, Myles developed a plan to begin his educational journey at the University of Maine at Augusta. Part of that plan

included a referral to the UMA TŘIO Scholars Program where he received amazing support. Myles graduated from UMA with a Bachelor's degree in Applied Science in 2017, along with an Addiction Studies Minor, was in the UMA Honors Program, and graduated Summa Cum Laude. Myles's dream did not end there, he went on to complete an MBA in Healthcare Management from Husson University and graduated in 2018 with a 3.93 GPA.

Myles's professional life has focused on recovery and addiction treatment. Currently, he is working as a Clinical Supervisor with the Presque Isle Comprehensive Treatment Center. From 2020-2023 he worked for GROUPS Recover Together, as a Facilitator and Community Development Manager where he was responsible for expanding the program statewide. In addition to this, Myles co-facilitated a nurturing father's class for the inmates at the Knox County Jail and was a Mentor for the Restorative Justice Project, where he mentored first-time offender youth, and In 2022 he was appointed to the Maine Recovery Council by the Senate President.

According to Myles, Maine TRIO helped him find his life's purpose and empowered him to reach his full potential. Myles, credits TRIO not only with helping him to complete postsecondary education but also with saving his life. As a way of giving back, Myles has been an amazing voice in support of TRIO programming. In 2018, Myles attended the Council for Opportunity in Education Policy Seminar and was keynote at Maine's Hall of Flags. He has worked as a recruiter for the Maine Educational Opportunity Center and the Veteran's Upward Bound program. Most recently, Myles participated in the amazing First Gen Day 2023.

In November 2022, the Council for Opportunity in Education (COE) selected Myles Ouellette from a national pool to represent Educational Opportunity programming in celebration of the 50th Anniversary of Educational Opportunity Centers nationwide. On May 2, 2023, Myles's story was recognized by Senator Susan Collins on the floor of the senate as she was fighting for continued support of TRIO programming and as an example of how TRIO programs play a critical role in helping first-generation, low-income families seek higher education opportunities.

Early College Coursework for Maine High School Students

Presentation will focus on the early college opportunities supported by the Department of Education in partnership with the Maine Community College and the University of Maine systems. The Department administers two early college programs. The Aspirations program provides funding for up to 12 credits annually for eligible secondary school students and the Early College Grant program provides opportunities for CTE students to receive college credit while they complete their program of study requirements. The discussion will include eligibility, counseling and advising, and pathways intended to improve student success for potential postsecondary enrollment opportunities. Participants should keep in mind how they might use this information to encourage students who might not otherwise consider postsecondary education, to take part in these free or low cost college-credit bearing opportunities.
