

30 TRIO Programs throughout Maine

President's Update



For nearly 60 years, TRIO programs nationwide have successfully supported low-income, first-generation college-bound students and students with disabilities in their pursuit of a college education.

In Maine, TRIO programs serve students as young as 6th grade, adults returning to education, Veterans seeking training and education for new careers, and college students who are the first in the family to go or have a disability. Collectively, these programs provide an antidote to the barriers that first-gen, low-income, and students with disabilities face as they prepare for, enter, and complete a college degree: academic skills & support, coaching, tutoring, career exploration, mentoring, social and emotional support, and a vital sense community.

As the number of workers approaching retirement grows and Maine strives to attract new industries and businesses, the need for college-

educated adults is increasingly urgent. To address the coming workforce cliff, we cannot afford to leave anyone behind in accessing post-secondary education. And yet we know that first-generation and limited-income students are 4 times less likely to achieve a degree than their peers with college-educated parents. TRIO programs know what those students need to get TO college and successfully get THROUGH and achieve their degree.

Our best practices are already making a difference in students' lives. Those students are entering college more prepared, persisting and graduating at higher rates, and entering the workforce prepared to solve the problems of the 21st century. Unfortunately, TRIO programs touch less than

10% of the eligible population in Maine. Threats to TRIO funding, even level funding, limit the ability of TRIO programs to reach more deeply into communities where opportunity lags and do what they do best- move students across the educational spectrum from poverty to prosperity, interrupt generational poverty, and all of its associated negative outcomes. The future of Maine's economy depends on TRIO programs because #TRIOWORKS.

...serving the needs of Maine's students!

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY CENTER (EOC)

Maine's EOC program worked with 2,269 participants last year at an average cost of just \$359 per participant.

This program serves the entire state.

479 Maine EOC participants enrolled in PSE.

MEOC offered academic advising, personal counseling, career workshops, college and financial aid application assistance, default loan rehabilitation, test preparation, and financial and economic literacy education.

EDUCATIONAL TALENT SEARCH (ETS)

Maine's 2 Educational Talent Search programs worked with 1,611 participants last year at an average cost of just \$577 per participant.

These programs serve Androscoggin, Aroostook, Cumberland, Oxford, Penobscot, and Waldo counties.

STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES (SSS)

Maine's 16 SSS programs served 2,865 students at an average cost of just \$1,940 per participant.

These programs serve Androscoggin, Aroostook, Cumberland, Franklin, Kennebec, Penobscot, and Washington counties.

51% of Talent Search seniors who enrolled in PSE in 2017 have since completed a college degree.

ETS program services include academic, financial, and career counseling; exposure to college campuses; tutoring services; assistance in completing the college admissions process; and assisting with financial aid applications.

Based on information reported to MEEOA in February 2024 for the previous year.

88% of reported students* are in good standing, and 85% are continuing in PSE.

SSS program services may include Intensive academic, financial, and personal counseling, tutoring services, and assistance completing college and financial aid applications.

*12 of the 16 SSS programs were able to provide data in time for printing.

UPWARD BOUND (UB)

Maine's 9 UB programs served 641 participants at an average cost of \$5,222 per participant.

These programs serve Androscoggin, Aroostook, Cumberland, Franklin, Kennebec, Lincoln, Oxford, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Sagadahoc, Somerset, Washington, and York counties.

UPWARD BOUND MATH/SCIENCE (UBMS)

Maine's Upward Bound Math Science program served 67 participants at an average cost of \$5,489 per participant.

This program serves Cumberland, Franklin, Piscataquis, and Somerset counties.

74% of graduating seniors enrolled in PSE.

Services students received include academic instruction in math, science, complosition, literature and foreign language; tutoring and mentoring; academic, financial, and personal counseling; assistance completing college and financial aid applications; and career exploration.

Based on information reported to MEEOA in February 2024 for the previous year.

79% of graduating seniors enrolled in PSE.

This program includes an intensive summer program focusing on math and science training, year-round counseling and advising, computer training, exposure to university faculty who perform research in math and science, and scientific research conducted under the guidance of a faculty or graduate student mentor.*

VETERANS UPWARD BOUND (VUB)

Maine's Veterans Upward Bound program served 125 participants at an average cost of \$2,476 per participant.

This program serves the entire state.

80% of the 2021 cohort completed PSE.

Services included connection to qualifying veterans benefits; academic, financial, and personal counseling; tutoring services; refresher classes for subjects required in college; assistance completing college and financial aid applications; and basic skills development for GED completion.

Founded and co-organized by participants of UMaine's TRIO SSS program (pictured), alongside other UMaine community members in 2023, the Black Bear Mutual Aid Fund (BBMAF) is a registered 501(c)(3) non-profit and community care organization led for and by students, faculty, and staff at the University of Maine.

Following research conducted regarding the community's needs and how these could be met through mutual aid, BBMAF was designed to alleviate economic hardships and build a culture of community care within the UMaine community.

Knowing that connection and a sense of belonging are the foundation of any

healthy community, the Black Bear Mutual Aid Fund is working to make the UMaine community one of solidarity and create a community support system through mutual aid. As TRIO SSS students themselves, these Board of Directors members know that the TRIO programs recognize the need for and importance of this kind of community of care.

In 10 months, BBMAF has raised nearly \$15,200, and by the end of February, expects to have redistributed over \$14,800 to over 46 undergraduate students, graduate students, and staff to alleviate financial hardships within the UMaine community.
