The Power of Positive Experiences



Educate. Engage. Empower.

"The Power of Positive Experiences" is an interactive, research-informed learning session designed for those who support Maine youth in their schools and communities every day. This three-hour interactive workshop translates the science of resilience and Positive Childhood Experiences (PCEs) into practical strategies that help educators and mentors create environments where young people can thrive. It also covers the importance of creating opportunities for staff to cultivate their own positive experiences together in ways that reduce the likelihood of compassion fatigue and turnover.

Grounded in the Science of the Positive, this session provides both insight and hands-on learning designed to revive your connection to yourself and to others and increase your capacity to support young people. Participants will deepen their understanding of how experiences shape lifelong health and well-being—and discover how intentional moments of connection can transform outcomes for themselves and the students they serve.

About Maine Youth Thriving: Maine Youth Thriving (MyT; pronounced “mighty”), formally Maine Resilience Building Network is dedicated to fostering resilient communities, schools, and families that prioritize the positive. We do this by building awareness, education, and partnership. Our team of experts provide trauma-informed, equity-centered professional development, comprehensive programs, resources, and individualized consultations to youth-serving professionals, healthcare providers, educators, caregivers and community members. Through these grassroots efforts, we aim to make a positive and lasting impact on the lives of Maine’s future generations. Keynote Speaker: Senator Jill Duson



A steadfast leader in the City of Portland and throughout the state of Maine, Senate Assistant Majority Leader Jill C. Duson served as a member and Chair of the School Committee prior to serving over 19 years as an At-Large City Councilor, including two terms as appointed Mayor.

As an elected municipal official, Sen. Duson fought for resources to support schools, while at the same time holding school leaders accountable to create a quality system where all students can learn and thrive. Sen. Duson focused on ensuring safe, affordable and accessible housing options in Portland that match the diverse needs of those who live and work in the city.

Additionally, the Senator has been a strong advocate on environmental policy. She has a substantial record of active leadership regarding Blue Economy sustainability, sea level rise mitigation, advocacy for public trails and open space conservation and working waterfront preservation in Greater Portland and across the state.

Keynote Speaker: Senator Jill Duson



The Senator is a retired attorney and a Maine state employee. Her most recent state service included Director of Compliance for the Maine Human Rights Commission and Director of the Bureau of Rehabilitation Services. Standing up for accountability, reform and transparency on behalf of Mainers has been a constant throughout her professional career.

A child of the Civil Rights movement, Sen. Duson was inspired by the activism of her mother, who empowered local parents to protest and demonstrate for over two years to achieve court-ordered desegregation of schools in her hometown. Recognizing that those who came before her fought to open doors, Sen. Duson has dedicated a lifetime to serving our community and holding doors open for today's students, families, emerging activists and leaders. She is committed to paying the fight forward.

Sen. Duson holds a Bachelor of Arts from Antioch University and a Juris Doctorate from the University of Pennsylvania School of Law. She is serving her second term in the Maine Senate, where she serves on the Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee and the Government Oversight Committee.

Sen. Duson is first Black woman to serve in the Maine Senate. She represents Senate District 27, which includes part of Portland and part of Westbrook.

Both personally and professionally, Anna has come to embody the ways in which TRIO empowers students to believe in themselves on their own terms. In 2019, she applied to be a SMCC TRIO Peer Leader; she excelled in this role working one-to-one with fellow TRIO students. With her confidence growing, she decided to transfer to UMF to study special education. As someone with learning differences herself, Anna had often felt like an outsider. Her experiences at both SMCC and UMF allowed her to flip the script, looking from the inside out by learning about myriad ways people experience and navigate the world. With her UMF degree in hand, she has strived to translate her book learning into practice to help people who face barriers to success, first as a Vocational Support Advisor at Goodwill and more recently, as a TRIO Coach at SMCC, working specifically with students with disabilities. She has shared with me that stepping into a position to provide the same services that she herself received has been empowering and humbling, especially at a time when TRIO's very existence is at risk. TRIO has meant the world to her, both during her undergrad and as she begins her professional career.

Bella credits Upward Bound as of the most transformative influences of her academic journey, helping her build confidence, strengthen her skills, and to truly see herself as capable of achieving more than she ever thought was possible. While in UB, Bella was nominated for the TORCH Scholarship at Northeastern University, and ended up receiving said scholarship, which gave her a full-ride to her dream college. After finishing her first year at Northeastern, Bella returned to Maine and worked as a TA for the Upward Bound program because she wanted to give back to the program that had given her so much. Since graduating from Northeastern University with a degree in Criminal Justice/Criminology and minors in Psychology and Law & Public Policy, Bella has built a career dedicated to victim advocacy and public service, as well as receiving her National Advocate Credentials. Her co-op with the Kennebec County District Attorney's Office introduced her to the field of victim services, and after graduation she returned as a legal secretary and victim advocate for the Juvenile Crimes Unit, where she worked closely with restorative justice programs. In 2022, she continued this work at the Sagadahoc County District Attorney's Office, focusing primarily on domestic violence cases. Bella now serves as a Victim Advocate in the Criminal Division of the Maine Attorney General's Office, working with families who have lost loved ones to homicide. Her role includes early support during investigations, ongoing communication through complex court processes, and standing with families as cases move toward trial.

In high school, Mya was a part of the Educational Talent Search program through her high school (Lake Region). She credits ETS with helping her immensely through the college application and financial aid process, which was done mostly virtually due to COVID. During her senior year she applied and ended up enrolling in the Human Services major at CMCC. While at CMCC, Mya participated in the TRIO SSS program, which allowed her to be more prepared for what to expect in college. In July of 2023, while she was volunteering with Loaves and Fishes at a barbecue and resource fair for the unhoused, she was granted a Pay It Forward Certificate from the Alumni of Distinction for 2023, and was also a member of the board of directors of the Alumni Association of UMA. At the end of her major at CMCC, the TRIO program assisted her with navigating how to apply for a practicum and which organizations would best suit me. Through this, she ended up applying for her practicum at Safe Voices, an organization that supports survivors of Domestic Violence and Sex Trafficking. At the end of her practicum with Safe Voices and after graduating from CMCC, she was encouraged by the Shelter Advocates at Safe Voices to apply for a job with them. She applied and was hired immediately after her practicum. She now works as an Advocate at the Safe Voices shelters. In this role she works with survivors of Domestic Violence and Sex Trafficking at the shelters, and also supports survivors in finding housing.

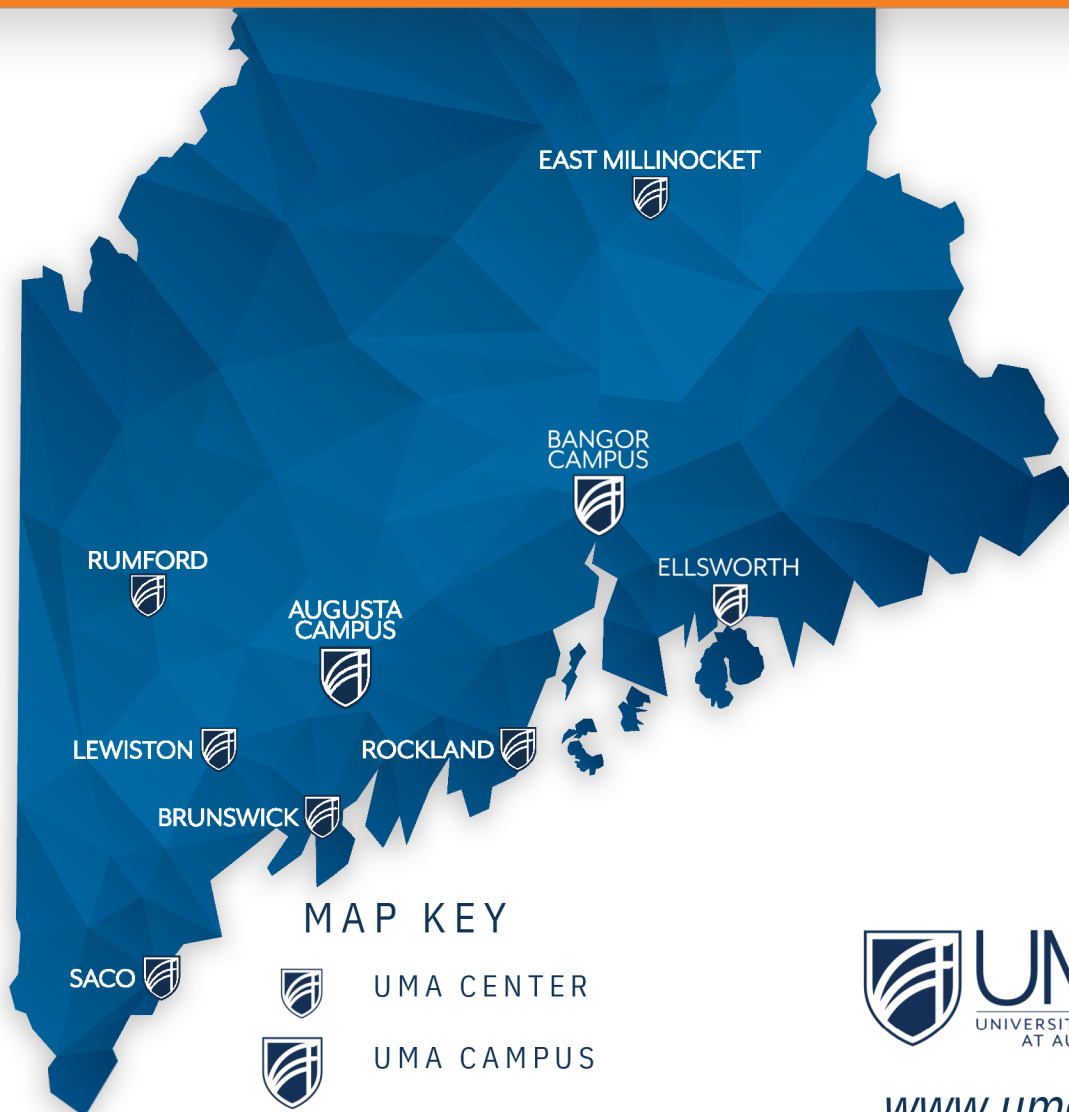
